Letter from the Kegworth Rectory

Dear friends

As we draw closer to Easter and the life changing events that we celebrate at that point, I want to ask a question of you. How was Lent for you?

I ask because the majority of us fail miserably at keeping it. Or even if we don't, we drop the control as soon as possible. For example, someone I know would cut out alcohol for Lent. He hated every minute of it, but he felt it was doing his health good by doing it, and that kept him strong. However as soon as Lent was over he would immediately celebrate by having a drink – and wait till next year to give his liver another holiday.

Now, in a sense there is nothing wrong with that attitude – he, like so many people, have denied themselves something in a way that enables them to emulate Christ. But what if that isn't what Jesus meant? He calls us all to take up our cross and follow him – into eternity, not just for 40 days. So do we give up everything forever? Or have we missed the point even more than that? What if our cross isn't the outward things that we feel a little like we depend upon – like caffeine or chocolate? What if our cross is more fundamental – anything that we rely on rather than relying on God? What are your crutches? What do you need to let go of in order to take up your new burden? A Godly burden that Jesus promises will be light and easy to carry by comparison?

Happy Easter one and all, and may you know the power of his resurrection this Easter.

“Jesus, Light of the World” - Easter Exhibition in your Church

This year we are hoping to do something different in our churches for Holy Week and Easter. In conjunction with our schools, we will be setting up a reflective trail around each church. The trail is planned to be fully interactive and will be suitable both for children and adults. It will take visitors through the last days of Christ life. The idea comes from an exhibition of

‘Jesus: the Light of the World’
displayed in Leicester Cathedral last year. At the time of going to press, we have not finalised opening times, but look out for local publicity or just try the church door to see if it’s open. I think you will be surprised and amazed at the beautiful and accessible artwork.



Bishop’s Lent Appeal

Bishop Tim’s Lent Appeal this year is in aid of the HIV/AIDS Awareness, Attention and Alleviation Project based in Dharapuram in South India. The appeal is aimed at helping make a long term difference to the quality of life of our partners in Trichy Diocese, South India. Over 2.5 million people in India are living with HIV and more than half are under the age of 25. For those people the stigma of HIV prevents many from seeking testing or treatment. Launde Abbey - Major Fundraising Effort



You may have heard that Launde is planning a major refurbishment of the main house this coming year - and needs to raise a substantial amount of money to fund the work.

Last year the Abbey celebrated its 50th Anniversary - it was 50 years since Mr and Mrs Coleman gave the building and its grounds to the diocese as a retreat house. A couple of years ago it became the retreat house for the Diocese of Peterborough as well as Leicester. It's become a place that many people, from Leicestershire, and from much further afield, have grown to love and cherish.

It has become increasingly successful both as a place of quiet retreat, and as a place for meetings. Its annual programme is packed with fascinating quiet days, retreats and courses, but anyone can book it as a venue for their own event. It offers Christian hospitality to all who cross its threshold - people of faith, people of no faith, and perhaps especially people who are on the journey of faith for the first time.

It's a wonderfully tranquil place if you simply need somewhere to spend a day away from it all, recharging your batteries or reconnecting with God. And of course, at its heart there is the chapel, where daily prayer is offered right through the year.

Finance for the future

The Abbey is run as a stand-alone business. It covers its day to day running costs, including paying the total costs for its two resident clergy, without needing support from the diocese or from the parishes.

Thanks to the generosity of many people - individuals, and especially the Friends of Launde Abbey - the Abbey was able to renovate the Stable Block last year. Now it's the turn of the Main House. There's a lot of work to do to bring the whole Abbey up to scratch - to make it safe, to make it accessible to disabled people and to modernise its facilities.

Once this major project has been completed the Abbey should be secure for the next 50 years, well-equipped to serve the next generation. And we have a responsibility to make sure that that happens.

So the Abbey and diocese will be launching a major fund-raising effort this spring. There will be plenty of opportunities for you to help, but here is just one that you might like to know about.

A friend in need

The Friends of Launde are keen to play their part and are planning a Spring Fair for Bank Holiday Monday, May 25th. The fair will be opened by the High Sheriff of Leicestershire at 11.00am. The aim is to raise a lot of money.

So we're looking for all sorts of things to sell on the day: good-as-new clothes, plants, horse-rugs, tack and so on, cakes, sweets, preserves and other produce, gifts, antiques, children's clothes, toys, books - as well as items for the tombola and a raffle. A team of volunteers will be running the stalls, and all the profits will be going towards the redevelopment fund.

Spring clean

This is the time of year for sprucing up your home and clearing out your cupboards. So we're asking you to remember Launde while you're spring-cleaning, and to donate your unwanted items to the Spring Fair.

You can either bring them to your church on Sunday April 19th and we will collect them from there, or bring them directly to the Parsonage, 20 Hoby Road, Thrussington.

Frank Edward Hill

Frank was born at Breedon-On-The-Hill on 2nd March 1930 and came to live in Diseworth with his parents Helen and Edward Hill in 1959. One of five children, Frank had two sisters: Edna, who lives in Manchester and Joan, who passed away some years ago. He also had two brothers: Dennis, who died in 1992 and Geoff who emigrated to Canada and with whom he had lost touch.

Frank worked for local farmer Alf Mills for many years before being employed by Howards (later to become Tarmac) in Castle Donington, for 30 years.

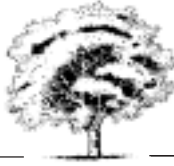
As well as looking after his own garden, for which he won many prizes, he was also the church gardener, taking care of the churchyard and garden and mowing the grass. Frank was a loyal member of the congregation and as well as being a sidesman, he was an enthusiastic and accomplished bell ringer. He missed being able to attend church when his health began to fail.

Frank was a long standing member of the original Retired Residents Committee and was active in helping to organise events: jumble sales, coach trips etc. A keen cricket fan, he liked to watch the Diseworth team play and he didn't have far to go, just a short walk through his garden and a stroll onto Cheslyns. He was also a champion darts player for the Bull & Swan team.

He was well known as a very private man but that privacy did not equal solitude. His home was his castle but he liked nothing better than to stop and chat with people he met when out for a walk. Frank read a newspaper every day and would then walk through the village to deliver it to his sister-in-law Margaret, this he did on a daily basis for many years. He was fond of listening to the radio, enjoyed playing Countdown every day and was a keen fan of Emmerdale.

Frank died peacefully on 17th February 2009, just short of his 79th birthday. He will be very sadly missed by all who knew him and we extend our sincere sympathy to Edna and to all his family. Diseworth will be a sadder place without him.





SPRING DRILLING



Now that the snow has gone and the fields have finally dried out, the race is on to finally drill some winter wheat. As I write, Will is in the second field having done one yesterday. Unfortunately, the weather forecast is not good and the wind is strengthening, blowing in the showers, so Will may soon be rained off and not able to start again for a few days.

It is not possible to drill corn in the wet as the soil surface soon becomes sticky and mud starts clinging to the wheels and drill. As the days tick by, the window of opportunity is rapidly closing for the sowing of winter crops. The soil is still cold after the winter, so

germination will be slow and there is a risk that the plants will grow too slowly and not produce a seed head, only leaves. A crop missed and time wasted. So after this particular field is done, Will is going to drill a certain amount of special wheat seed suitable for sowing late, and then the rest with spring barley to ensure that we have enough feed for the cattle during next winter.

Both sets of seed were delivered today, hopefully the bill won't follow too soon as both types are very expensive, but whatever the price, we didn't have any other option. Whether there will be any wheat and barley to sell after harvest will depend on what sort of weather we

have between now and the autumn. Looking at the state of the fields as we travelled up to Sheffield last week, many of the crops we saw look in a sorry state. A lot of the winter wheat is very yellow and has not grown much. The fields of oil seed rape are very patchy and the plants that are there are very small.

After a mild winter, oil seed rape can be in flower as early as March, not much chance of that this year. Some farmers may have to tear up some of their winter oil seed rape and drill again with spring rape. The harsh winter followed a difficult autumn, and many fields were drilled in less than perfect

conditions, sowed in hope that the weather would be reasonable over the winter. The last thing crops struggled in during a difficult back end was a lot of cold and wet over the winter. So it looks as if the see-saw will tip back again this year and cereals could be short again, so the prices will go up.

Last year, when we had plenty to sell, the prices were down, it's all about supply and demand after all. So we can only hope that the weather will stay dry and all the fields can finally be sowed with something that the cattle can eat or we can sell.

- extending the tarmac from the new surfaced area to include the front of the hall
- new locked gate at the main entrance to help secure the hard surface area and playing field from vehicles whilst the hall is not in use (this would incorporate a provision for people on foot to pass through)
- a more adventurous scheme for the long term would be to remove the playgroup store room on the rear of the stage and extend the main hall in line with the rear committee room.

So there's plenty going on. Anyone who feels they would like to support their hall but does not wish to get involved with committee meetings and the likes may like to consider helping us to replenish the crockery, through breakages or maybe items being borrowed (please return if you have any!). We are looking to re-stock where necessary by way of a donation. This idea worked in the past and we hope it to be successful again.

Finally, a couple of general points to make everyone aware of. Firstly, to help reduce the general work load it was decided that the 200 Club subscriptions will now be collected annually, ideally by direct debit, otherwise by cash or cheque. Your support in this matter is much appreciated. Finally, the subject of hire charges have recently been discussed, and in light of the fact that the bookings were down a little in 2008 and the imminent opening of the Heritage Centre it was decided not to increase charges for the time being. However, due to popular requests by our users, we have decided to put the heating on from October 1st, one month earlier. Therefore the winter hire rates will now apply for seven months from October to April inclusive. Sorry for any inconvenience.

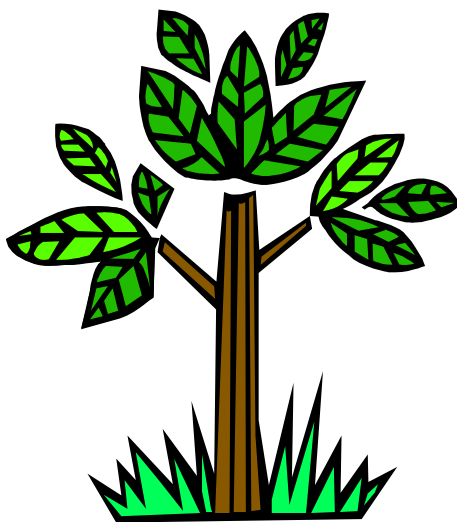

Diseworth Heritage Centre

The Heritage Centre is now open for business. The completion of the building work has been followed by a hectic month equipping and fitting out the various parts of the building, ready for the formal opening on Tuesday 7 April, when a plaque will be unveiled by the Lord Lieutenant, Jennifer, Lady Gretton, JP. Invitations have gone out to Trust members and others who have helped in various ways to see this stage of our work completed.

The opening of the Centre is a major event for a small village like Diseworth. It is the culmination of over ten years' work, starting with the Village Appraisal in 1998. From the responses to that survey came a range of ideas that have largely determined the content and programme of the Centre. More confirmation of the plans came from the Parish Plan, completed in 2006.

A small group of villagers came together to take the dream forward. In November 2000, serious flooding led to the closure of the Baptist Chapel, and the chance came to act. The Diseworth Heritage Trust was formed to negotiate with the Baptist Union for the purchase of the Chapel; charitable status was gained in 2003, and shortly after the Trust became a Company Limited by Guarantee. A price was agreed with the Baptist Union, and applications for grants began to be prepared. Two preliminary studies were undertaken: one funded by the Architectural Heritage Fund, and the second by Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF). The latter was of great significance, because the Development Plan it produced was accepted by HLF, which released a major grant of almost 90% of the estimated costs. We were pleased that the proceeds of the sale went to the sister church in Kegworth to help with their repairs and improvements.

One of the issues was agreeing a design for the extension which houses the entrance lobby and the toilets. We hope you like the result.

When work finally started in May 2008, another problem arose. There were bats in the roof, apparently for the whole summer season. Not any old bats, but long-eared bats, which look very sweet, but led to a "*do not disturb*" sign going up, and to a delay on starting work on the roof of almost 16 weeks. There were also additional costs because not only could we not disturb the bats while roosting, we also had to ensure they have a safe and accessible route back next summer and subsequently.

Then we found competition from the weather, one of the coldest winters for twenty or thirty years. A twenty six week programme in the end stretched to almost 40 weeks, and it was our good fortune that a visit of an EU agricultural delegation on 4 March was cancelled by Brussels: we would have been their first port of call after landing at EMA. They might not have felt very welcome!

The building was finally handed over on 6 March 2009. It was still full of workers, though, with the Village Office upstairs having its computer network installed, the kitchen being filled with china, glass and other necessities, and the Museum designers fitting their cabinets and graphic panels.

We think the end result more than justifies all the trials we have been through. We hope you do too. Following the official opening there will be a series of opportunities for residents of both Long Whatton and Diseworth to come and see for themselves.

A series of events will be planned to celebrate the history of Diseworth and Long

Whatton. We will introduce various groups to the village office: school pupils will be offered a homework club, local history groups will find research facilities, and training will be arranged for those who need help in upgrading their IT skills. Coffee mornings will be held for retired residents, young parents and their children, and evenings for young people (the latter with the help of the local youth workers).

We plan to promote local events of special interest. The first such event will be in September 2009, when there is to be a reunion of babies born at Whatton House during the second world war, when the House was used as a Maternity Home. A special exhibition and other events will be held at the Centre to coincide with the celebrations at Whatton House.

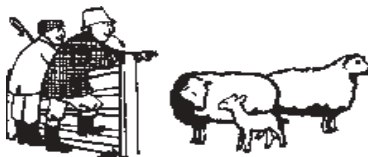

LONG WHATTON & DISEWORTH PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



FEBRUARY

As forecast, the postponed February meeting was busy. In Open Forum, discussion was about the “airport parking” issue. Agreed that official solutions which were acceptable to villagers would be hard to find and so the residents’ group needed to consider what might be possible and decide what would be acceptable in Diseworth. Some residents expressed an interest in having allotments provided in the Parish. The Clerk explained the formalities required. Another request was a footpath to Millennium Meadow (to be followed up with Highways). Concerns were expressed about parking on pavements and its inconvenience and dangers. The NWLDC Scrutiny Committee was looking into this and a Councillor might attend.

With only seven Councillors on this busy Council, filling the vacancy is important. Therefore the interest from Mr Simon Adcock was welcomed. He was co-opted to the Council and will attend his first meeting in March.

The Clerk had attended the local police consultation meeting. Though the business mainly concerned Kegworth, the smaller villages were not overlooked. A Neighbourhood Watch promotion had recently taken place in Long Whatton and there is a proposal to establish “No Cold Calling Zones” in the Parish. PC Underwood would be along soon to propose this to the Council.

An order has been placed to refurbish Long Whatton War Memorial. A grant will be made to the Explorer Scouts towards the cost of their Summer Camp.

There were consultations about the proposals to extend the A453 Clearway along the roads towards Diseworth. This was welcomed provided the Clearway was enforced. Also we’re consulted about the proposal for major improvements to the A453 beyond the M1 towards Nottingham.

The possibility of providing a bus shelter at Hathern Road / Turvey Lane has been brought back for more consideration. Notable planning applications include developments at Mill House, Long Whatton. The Council approved but expressed concern that a well-established footpath might be severed. Representations would be made.

MARCH

Just two weeks later on 5th March we were equally busy. The Chairman welcomed Cllr. Simon Adcock to the Council, saying that someone with a “younger” point of view would be valuable.

Affordable housing developments for both villages were currently at crucial stages and information would be made available as soon as possible. The promised Long Whatton public consultation meeting would be held on 7th May (see below).

Written requests for Garden Allotments have been received from six residents so far. The Council considered these and the Council’s obligations, recognising that the process of investigating demand and then seeking ways of meeting it would take some time. It was decided that anyone interested in the project should be invited to make contact. Write to me and say you are interested. If you can do this by email - longwhatdisepc@hotmail.com - I will include you on a round-robin email group to keep you up-to-date. But the key date is 7th May when everyone can come to the Annual Parish Meeting to express a view and discuss proposals (see below). Keep an eye on our website for news and also the posters announcing the meeting towards the end of April.

Similarly, requests have been received in the form of a petition for a bus shelter at Hathern Road/Turvey Lane, Long Whatton. Anyone interested is invited to come to the Parish Meeting for a discussion (see below).

At Gelscoe Lane, Diseworth - right on the edge of the Parish - a planning proposal for storage of 500 boats and caravans was considered. Councillors decided this would be acceptable, strictly provided no short or long-term residential use was allowed. More serious was a proposal to develop a petrol filling station, restaurant and parking on land between the A453 and M1 near the roundabout. This was strongly objected to.

The series of meetings referred to above will take place on Thursday 7th May at Long Whatton School Community Centre as follows:

From 4pm to 7pm (approx) - public exhibition, discussion and consultation about affordable housing for Long Whatton.

At 7.15pm the Annual Parish Meeting to consider, among any other matters raised, the provision of Garden Allotments and request for a bus shelter.

Following the Parish Meeting, the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council.

Full details are on the website - www.longwhattondiseworth.org.uk and will be announced on Notice Boards from around the end of April.

HEALTH PAGE

DE - STRESS THE SKIN FOR SUMMER



Looking forward to summer and the prospect of getting out our summer clothes, may prompt us to start looking more carefully at our skin. In the past it was always thought that the biggest villains behind skin aging apart from our genetic make up were smoking, pollutants in the air and too much sunbathing.

Now scientists have discovered that the unwelcome signs of aging such as lines, wrinkles, sags and brown age spots can also be caused by internal stress. When we are feeling anxious, the body produces large amounts of the flight and fight hormones cortisol and adrenalin. Our ancestors needed these hormones to raise blood sugar levels to enable them to fight or run away from predators. These days our bodies respond in the same way to traffic jams, stress at work and hassles at home but these hormones aren't burned off and nether is the excess blood sugar, as most of our stresses cannot be dealt with by fighting or running away. So they stay in our systems causing damage.

Stress damages the skin in the short term by increasing inflammation and in the long term by reducing immune system function, so leaving the skin weakened and less able to resist ultra violet light and skin damaging pollutants. Cortisol blocks the formation of collagen, a protein that keeps the skin firm and supple. Stress also causes the facial muscles to tighten up, making us looking strained and tense. One of the best ways to deal with stress is to get plenty of exercise and practice yoga or relaxation techniques. It can also be helpful to have a face massage or try one of these exercises.

- Rest the face in the hands and breathe gently. Fan the fingertips across the forehead and press down gently one by one starting with the little fingers in the middle and working out slowly to the index fingers remembering to keep breathing gently. Release the pressure slowly and repeat until you can feel the tension clearing.
- Place the tips of the index fingers just under the ridge of muscle running beneath the eyebrows. Concentrating on the centre of the brows, gently push them upwards and release. Repeat three times daily, or as often as you like to tone brow muscles.
- Place the index fingers under the muscles at each corner of the mouth, then push slowly upwards, and release. Repeat as for the previous exercise to help firm up droopy mouth muscles.
- Finally, smile, it exercises the face muscles and improves the mood.

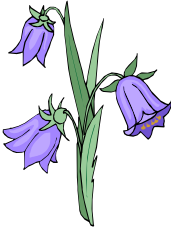

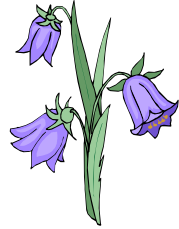

EAST MIDLANDS AIRPORT BRANCHES OUT

An inspirational and symbolic tree sculpture, which appears to break through the Airport floor, successfully growing upwards through the terminal ceiling, is providing a unique welcome feature for passengers arriving at East Midlands Airport.

Formally unveiled by the Rt Hon Geoff Hoon, Secretary of State for Transport, the iconic feature is part of an initiative funded by East Midlands Development Agency (*emda*). The tree symbolises creative roots in the past, morphing into an innovative and successful future. The tree has also been declared a 'kissing zone', where meeters and greeters are welcome to celebrate being reunited with their loved ones.

The tree has been created by design company, Can't Dance and constructed by Terance Dickson of Dickson Associates. It includes three LCD screens depicting some of the region's most renowned places to visit, with a further two screens located elsewhere in the terminal.

The main objective of the project is to provide overseas visitors with more detailed information on the region's attractions and grow interest and awareness of what the region has to offer international visitors. The Airport's Information Desk has been transformed into a tourist information centre; providing visitors with a range of informed literature on local tourist attractions. Visitors can also book local sightseeing trips using a newly installed interactive kiosk.

This summer, foreign language pages will be available on the Airport website, pages are being developed in French, German, Spanish and Dutch, to help inbound visitors with information on the Airport and the region.
